

Entering Grades 1- Summer Reading

We all welcome summer and all the fun activities there are. In your daily adventures please always pack a good book or two to read. Pack one for yourself too. Children learn by example! There's always time in the day for a good book!

Guidelines to help your child become a better reader (taken from Reading Rockets):

Make reading a part of your child's world. **Read EVERY day!** You can share reading by taking turns or for the younger readers, having them point out sight words in the story.

When reading with your child, help build your child's comprehension skills by asking questions about what they've read. For example, you could ask them who, what, when, where questions and to share predictions of what will happen next. Have them retell their favorite part, making sure they include details and encourage them to use character's names.

Encourage your child to reread his or her favorite books, stories, or poems.

Rereading will help your child read more quickly and accurately, which will give them added confidence when reading.

Help your child when she/he needs it. If she makes a mistake but is close, quickly repeat the word correctly and let her continue without interrupting the flow. If she guesses or is very off on a word, help her get the right meaning from the context of the sentence. Answer questions about the meaning of words, but don't drill her on vocabulary words as you read.

Praise him/her. Learning to read smoothly is hard work and might frustrate emergent readers at times. Encourage her by praising her efforts, paying attention when she wants to read, and making your reading time together fun!

Teach by example! Read your book while they are reading. This is invaluable!
